Children’s Social Care records reflect the ‘Child’s Voice.’

Respectful language towards children and young people as individuals and groups.

Children and young people involved in planning, name, branding and service standards of the new Children’s Social Care, Youth Justice & Exploitation Service.

The ‘Child’s World’ being the theme for the OSCB Conference 2020 allowed children and young people to speak out and be heard.

Learner Engagement’s, ‘Behaviour Pathway’ for schools, so children at risk of exclusion get an early intervention.

For the ‘YP Voices in GP Project’, 3 Oxford City GPs were used and involved young people as users of services who helped design and produce GP services.

“Schools and other services need to share more information between each other in order to help students more.”

Improvement of multi-agency chronologies that provide effective sharing of information across relevant agencies.

Revision of OSCB information sharing protocol.

‘YP Voices in GP Project’ included secondary schools in Oxford City, along with healthcare students and the school health nurse team.

“...services are very under-funded meaning support can either not continue or is restricted”.

New service within Children’s Social Care has greater number of permanent/committed staff in more teams, therefore increasing support to children and young people.

Higher level of support and increased housing units for children leaving care.

“Why do schools not help with how we feel and manage our feelings, it would help us work better and enjoy school”.

Oxfordshire MIND held workshops for schools/colleges, on mental health & wellbeing, anxiety, anger/healthy coping strategies and self-esteem.

Positive feedback from MIND workshops by young people in providing good physical/mental aspects and confidence in talking openly about their feelings.

Oxfordshire MIND workshops may continue due to successful outcomes.
