Who we are

We are a small team from Oxfordshire County Council's Museum Service, based at the Museums Resource Centre in Standlake.

What we do

We run 'hands on' sessions that provide an opportunity for object led conversations which can stimulate memories.

Which enables people to learn more about and engage with each other, perhaps learn something new and above all enjoy themselves.

Our trained facilitators visit community groups across Oxfordshire with a carefully chosen selection of interesting objects, photos and documents on a variety of themes.



Session Guidelines

- A member of your organisation must be present at all times. Their involvement is critical to a successful session to support members of the group and encourage participation.
- A semi circle format of chairs arranged around a central table works best, with chairs close enough together to allow objects to be easily passed around.
- Sessions usually last for 45 minutes to an hour, but we can tailor the session to your group's particular need.


Charges

The mystery box


This popular box is full of unusual and interesting objects - some you may recognise, but many that you won't. This session will get everyone guessing.
